

Part I – Agency Profile

Agency Overview

The Lava Hot Springs Foundation was created in 1919 to administer the State property in and around the city of Lava Hot Springs. It is governed by a five member Board of Directors appointed by the Governor to six-year terms. Mark Lowe serves as Executive Director overseeing the 10 full time employees and 75 temporary and seasonal workers who operate and maintain this world-class hot spring and recreational facility. The revenues generated by ticket sales, rentals and retail sales provide for the operation and maintenance of the approximately 180 acres deeded to the State by the Federal Government in 1902.

Core Functions/Idaho Code

Idaho Code, Chapter 67-4401 through 4409 provides for the management of State property in and around Lava Hot Springs. Our core function is to ensure that the public has access to healthful, clean and inviting facilities for recreation and healing purposes.

Performance Highlights

Attendance continues to be weather dependant and is impacted by world events such as war and gas pricing. Speed slides were constructed at the Olympic Swimming Complex in FY2009. FY 2010 was first full year of operation for the Speed Slides. Reserve funds were used to pay an additional \$500,000 on the speed slides showing an artificial imbalance in the revenue vs. expenditures. Without the additional payment the actual revenue over expenditure in FY 2011 was \$451,500. Reserve Funds were used in FY 2013 to pay for the construction of the Portneuf Kiddie Cove, an indoor swimming pool/play area for children. Without this capital outlay for the new construction, revenue over expenditure was \$468,000. These additional funds are invested in an interest bearing account with the State Treasurer to fund maintenance and improvement projects.

Performance Measure Explanatory Note

The benchmarks for both the Hot Pool and Swimming Pool were increased 25% in 2012 to reflect expanded capabilities.

The Speed Slides at the Olympic Swimming Complex span the main public roadway into the City of Lava Hot Springs providing a visual attraction as well as a participatory attraction. The Olympic Swimming Complex is evolving into a popular water theme park versus a competitive swimming pool setting. Completed this year was the Portneuf Kiddie Cove, an indoor pool/play area designed especially for young children. It is anticipated that this pool will increase the attendance at the facility both winter and summer.

The new pool at the hot pool facility expanded the capacity of the facility and provides a cooler pool. The cooler pool is popular during the warmer summer months and for those people who cannot tolerate the higher temperatures of the older pools. The updated dressing rooms that were completed in 2005 and the new pool completed in fiscal year 2010 have combined to make the overall facilities more popular with the recreating public.

The entire entry way for the Olympic Swimming Complex was replaced in 2011 consisting of 4,700 square feet of heated deck. This enhancement makes it more functional than plain concrete decking, improving the safety of the deck and making an attractive entrance to the facility. Half of the deck around the indoor swimming pool was replaced this fiscal year making a smooth transition into the new Portneuf Kiddie Cove.
