Mission

The Idaho SILC's mission is to promote the independent living philosophy for all Idahoans with disabilities: choice, self-determination and access for all.

Vision

The Idaho SILC promotes a philosophy of independent living, including the following:

- consumer control
- peer-support
- self-help
- self-determination
- equal access
- individual and systemic advocacy, maximizing opportunities for full inclusion of individuals with disabilities within the broader community

Organizational Information

The Idaho SILC is actively engaged in activities that help provide Idahoans with disabilities a greater voice in obtaining services that are consumer responsive, cost effective and community based. We are solutions oriented; working with many public agencies, private non-profit and for-profit organizations to improve the quality of life and independence for Idahoans with disabilities.

Council duties are directed in Title VII, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended:

- Develop, sign and submit the State Plan for Independent Living (SPIL) for people with disabilities. The SILC will monitor, review and evaluate the implementation of the SPIL.
- Support the Centers for Independent Living (CILs) and advocate for independent living (IL) services provided through state and federal programs for individuals with disabilities.
- Gather and disseminate information, conduct studies and analyses, develop model
 policies, conduct training on IL philosophy, outreach to unserved and underserved
 populations and work to expand and improve IL services.
- Develop a plan for the provision of resources to the SILC.
- Develop and pursue a public policy agenda that results in positive systemic change for people with disabilities.

Additionally, Chapter 12, Title 56, Idaho Code, requires that the Council:

- Assess the need for services for Idahoans with disabilities and advocate with decision makers.
- Supervise and evaluate such staff as may be necessary to carry out the functions of the council.
- Ensure that all regularly scheduled meetings of the council are open to the public and that sufficient advance notice of meetings is provided pursuant to the open meeting law.
- Prepare reports and make recommendations, as necessary.
- Perform other activities the Council deems necessary to increase the ability of Idahoans with disabilities to live independently.
- Promulgate rules, as may be necessary in compliance with Chapter 52, Title 67, Idaho Code.

The Idaho SILC is funded through a combination of federal and state funds. It operates projects, monitors, conducts activities and reports within the context of both the state and federal fiscal years.

The Idaho State Strategic Plan mirrors the Idaho State Plan for Independent Living (SPIL) which is required by federal mandate and reported to the Administration on Community Living (ACL). It is based on statewide assessment, conducted every three years and monitored quarterly, as well as regionally specific demographic data and geographical information. The 2021-2023 SPIL was approved by ACL and implemented October 1, 2020. We completed our three-year statewide assessment of needs of Idahoans with disabilities from which our 2024-2026 SPIL will be developed. We have submitted a one-year SPIL extension with technical amendments to ACL for approval.

External Factors Impacting the Idaho SILC

The Workforce Innovation and Opportunities Act of 2014 (WIOA) transferred the Independent Living Services and Centers for Independent Living programs funded under title VII, Chapter 1 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended by WIOA (P.L. 113-128) (Rehabilitation Act) from the Rehabilitation Services Administration (RSA), U.S. Department of Education, to the Independent Living Administration (part of the Administration on Disabilities) within the Administration for Community Living (ACL), U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. The transfer of the Independent Living (IL) programs aligns with the mission of ACL to maximize the independence, well-being and health of individuals with disabilities across the lifespan, and their families and caregivers.

Ongoing structural changes within the Department of Health and Human Services continue to impact SILCs nationally. The transformation is ongoing as the Administration seeks to consolidate the Independent Living Administration, the Office on Independent Living Programs and other divisions within the Administration on Disabilities under ACL.

SILC's nationally have experienced unanticipated challenges in the last several years related to SPIL development and submission due to technical difficulties at ACL, U.S. DHHS. The three-year assessment and SPIL cycle has been reset through the 2021-2023 SPIL due to delays at the federal level. The Council extended and amended the 2017-2019 SPIL for the year 2020 and it was approved by ACL September 27, 2019. The resulting one-year extended/amended SPIL served as bridge to the 2021-2023 SPIL after vetting through a vigorous public meeting and 30-day public comment period. Due to delays at the federal level, the three-year

assessment and SPIL cycle has been reset, extending the 2021-2023 SPIL through FFY 2024. The Council made technical amendments and extended the 2021-2023 SPIL through FFY 2024 as directed by the Administration on Community Living (ACL). Upon approval by ACL, the extended SPIL will be implemented on October 1, 2023. Though our federal timelines have changed, the SILC's duties remain consistent under both federal and state law.

We frequently monitor progress of the SPIL in response to the shifting demands related to the health emergency, shifting needs and Idaho's recent growth. Given that 13-24% of the U.S. population has a disability, the SILC continues to experience increased demand for independent living education and systemic services which enhance community living across Idaho. The SILC supports a move away from institutional care which is both financially and socially more costly than the provision of Medicaid Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) and supports.

The SILC is rapidly responding to changing statewide needs, an evolving workplace, reduced resources and increased demand for community access and independent living opportunities for Idahoans with disabilities across the lifespan. Due at least in part to our statewide emergency preparedness activities in recent years, the SILC faces increased demands requiring flexibility, continuity and improved efficiencies.
